The 2025 Rotary Council on Legislation met in Chicago, Illinois, from April 13-17. It was a gathering of representatives from Rotary districts worldwide, where they discussed and voted on proposed changes to Rotary International's governing documents. This triennial event, where Rotarians debate and vote on proposed enactments, is a key mechanism for Rotary to adapt and evolve. Thank you, *PDG Kathy Flamson* for being 5130 Representative. Here's a more detailed look: **Purpose**: The Council on Legislation (COL) is the primary body within Rotary International that amends its constitution. It provides a platform for Rotarians to propose and vote on changes to the organization's rules and procedures.

Frequency: The COL meets every three years.

Process: Proposed enactments, submitted by clubs, districts, the RI Board, and other authorized bodies, are considered by the Council. These proposals can cover various topics, including club administration, membership, governance, finances, and The Rotary Foundation. **Key Decisions**: The 2025 COL approved a dues increase and allowed clubs to be chartered with fewer members. They also discussed and voted on other proposals related to financial transparency, governance models, and terminology updates.

Influence: The decisions made at the Council on Legislation have a direct impact on how Rotary International operates and functions. **Future**: The next COL will be in 2028, and Rotarians can begin proposing enactments for that session after the 2025 convention.

Rotary's 2 Official Mottos

At Rotary's second convention in 1911, held in Portland, Oregon, *He Profits Most Who Serves Best* was adopted as a motto. The phrase was inspired by a speech given by Arthur Frederick Sheldon at the first convention in Chicago, where he stated that "business is the science of human services" and that true profit comes from serving others well.

During the same Portland convention, the idea for *Service Above Self* emerged during a river outing. Ben Collins, president of the Minneapolis Rotary Club, shared his club's guiding principle—*Service, Not Self*—with Seattle Rotarian J.E. Pinkham and Rotary founder Paul Harris. Harris encouraged Collins to present it to the convention, where it was warmly received.

In 1950, both phrases—He Profits Most Who Serves Best and Service Above Self—were officially adopted as Rotary mottoes. In 1989, Service Above Self was established as the principal motto. The original motto was later updated to They Profit Most Who Serve Best in 2004 and to its current form, One Profits Most Who Serves Best, in 2010.
